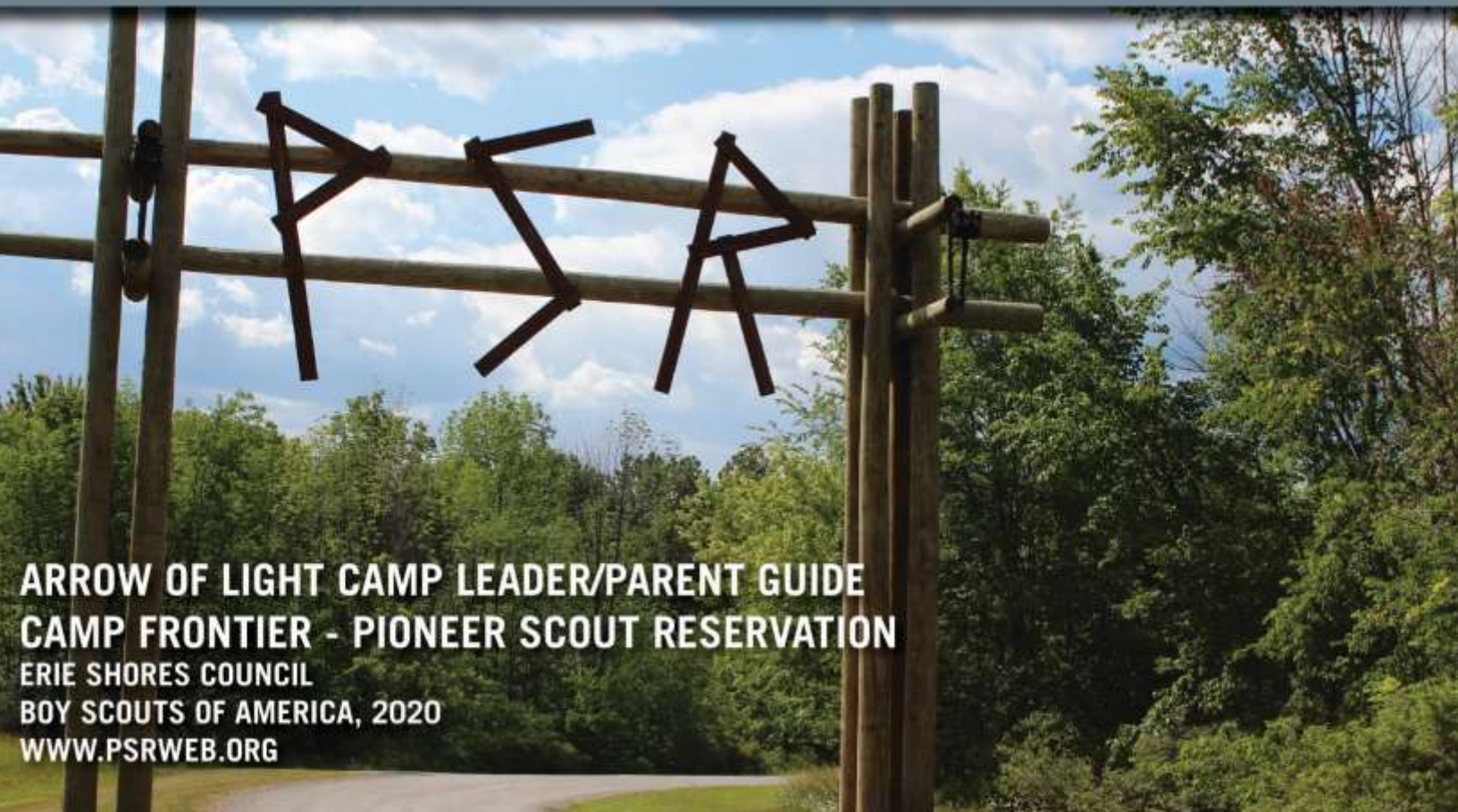

Dear Arrow of Light Den Leaders & Parents,

Welcome to Pioneer Scout Reservation, Camp Frontier! 2020 marks our 15<sup>th</sup> year of offering Arrow of Light Resident Camp. We continue to develop the program and offerings so we can put on an excellent, high quality and safe program for your Arrow of Light Scouts.

Arrow of Light Resident Camp is a great opportunity for Arrow of Light Scouts to experience what awaits them in future years once they crossover to Scouts BSA. The Scouts will visit multiple areas in camp while they have fun and work on parts of various Arrow of Light Activity Badges. Some of the fun activities the Scouts will experience include the shooting areas, playing water-ball, wall climbing, Ecology, and Handicrafts!

Even though not required, ideally, Scouts will come to the resident camp with the rest of their friends from their own den. We recommend that Scouts come to camp with a few of their friends along with two leaders. At a minimum, each pack at camp *must* have at least two adult from their unit. A Ratio of 1 adults to every 4 Scouts is required at minimum per pack.

This guide was put together to help answer common questions that leaders & parents might have about the camp. We will have a pre-camp meeting on 7/22/20 at 7:00 PM at the Jadel Center for all registered Arrow of Light parents and leaders to collect any remaining fees and forms and to answer questions. We will also give an overview of what check-in day will be like.

# GENERAL INFORMATION

## Who May Attend Arrow of Light Resident Camp?

Open to all BSA registered Arrow of Light Scouts (sorry, siblings and friends may not participate). Scouts not registered with the BSA will not be allowed to attend camp, so avoid disappointment by taking care of paperwork before camp starts.

## Requirements to Attend Arrow of Light Resident Camp

- An Arrow of Light Scout can attend with a parent or guardian who is age 21 or over.
- An Arrow of Light Scout can attend camp with an adult from their pack. A one 21+ adult to four Scouts ratio must be maintained.
- The very best experience for an Arrow of Light Scout would be to attend camp with other Arrow of Light Scouts from their den AND be accompanied by a parent or guardian.
- All Arrow of Light Scouts attending must be registered with the Boy Scouts of America (they cannot attend otherwise)
- All packs and/or dens must ensure sufficient leadership at all times. A minimum of 2 adult leaders are required per Pack and 1 adult is required for every 4 Scouts. Adults must be at least 21 years of age.
- Every adult and Scout that will be in camp must bring the BSA Health Form to camp (Parts A and B).
- Adults may stay in a tent with their child ONLY, or they may allow the youth scout of the same gender to stay together in a tent and adults stay in a separate tent.

## Refund Policy

Summer Camp fees are **non-refundable**; however, they may be transferred to another Scout who is attending camp. This transfer applies on a one to one basis. Refunds for medical reasons or a family emergency may be requested online at [www.psrweb.org/RefundRequest](http://www.psrweb.org/RefundRequest) within 2 weeks after your unit's week at camp. **Refunds are issued only for medical and/or family emergencies, less 15%. If the refund is approved, it will be mailed after September 1<sup>st</sup>. Please share this policy with your parents.**

## Pre-camp Leader and Parents Meeting

A parent and leader meeting is scheduled for July 22, 2020 at the Erie Shores Council Jadel Center to turn in all remaining forms. At this meeting, we will discuss the first day of camp and what to expect. The meeting will start at 7:00 PM. All parents and leaders are invited to this meeting. Please turn in BSA Health Forms (parts A and B) and Informed Consent, Release Agreement, and Authorization Forms for all those planning to attend camp. Camp leadership will be at this meeting to answer questions.

## Youth Protection

To address the potential problem of youth/child abuse within the program, the BSA has established the following procedures:

- Two Deep Leadership
- No one on one contact
- Respect of privacy
- Separate accommodations
- No secret organizations
- Appropriate attire
- No hazing

## Safe Transportation to Camp

- When transporting Scouts to camp, make sure you follow the rules published in the Guide to Safe Scouting (available at the Scout Shop or online at <http://www.scouting.org/HealthandSafety/GSS.aspx>). Most packs car pool or use buses to transport Scouts. It is imperative that each vehicle is safe and operated safely.
- Please park in designated areas at camp. Vehicles should remain parked until departure from camp.

## Spending Money

The amount of spending money needed depends on the Scout's own circumstances and is at the discretion of the Scout and their parents. Typical amounts brought by Scouts vary from \$10 - \$40; however, a Scout can have a very enjoyable time without any extra spending money. The Trading Post is well stocked and provides everyone a variety of equipment, literature, souvenir items and snacks. We will have a special Frontier t-shirt for sale in the Trading Post. It is important to remember that each Scout is responsible for their own money.

## Electronic Device Charging

Have a camera, laptop, or other electronic device and need to charge it? Just stop by the Trading Post and we will charge it for you. Drop-off/pick-up of devices is during normal posted hours. Please have your name on both the charger and device.

## Laundry Facilities

Coin-operated laundry facilities are located at the quartermaster building for your convenience. **Please only place clean and washed clothes into the dryers. SHOES AND BOOTS ARE NOT ALLOWED IN THE LAUNDRY MACHINES!**

## Dining Information

**Breakfast-** will be self-serve hot deluxe continental breakfast. Food will be set up for your convenience to enjoy as you want it. Please caution Scouts to eat what they take to help control wastes.

**Lunch-** will be served at the Pool (picnic style) or at the Dining Hall (cafeteria style) depending on the day.

**Dinner-** will be served cafeteria style.

## Food Allergies and Dietary Restrictions

Information on any adult or Scout requiring special food for medical or religious reasons must notify camp at least two weeks prior to your arrival. Notification is completed on our website at <https://www.psrweb.org/SpecialDietForm>. We will do our best accommodating your Scout's needs. If we cannot adequately meet your needs, you may also bring your own special dietary food at a discounted rate.

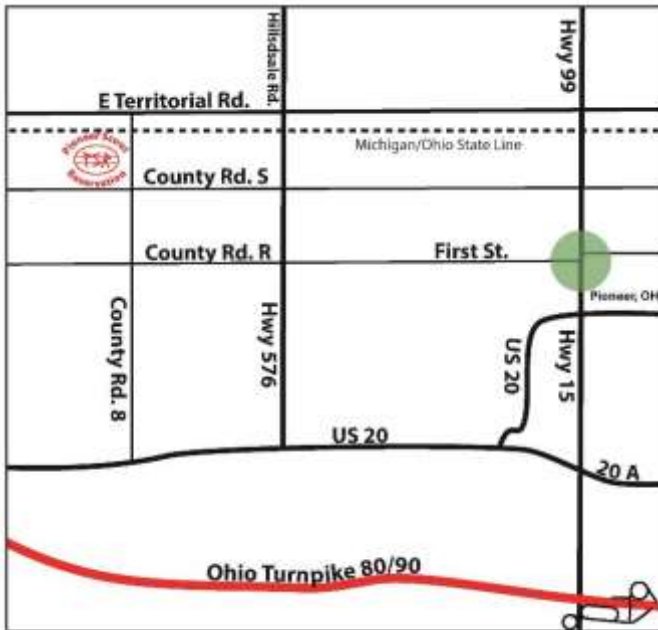
## Shower Facilities

Camp Frontier has four shower houses at camp. There are 3 shower buildings with private showers and changing areas as well as the pool shower house that has shower facilities for both adults and youth. Please work with your Scouts to keep the shower and restrooms clean and free of dirt and litter.

## Garbage Pickup/Recycling

Trash bags are at the Trading Post. Place your tied, filled bags by the nearest post that has a campsite name on it by **8:00 pm** to be picked up by the Camp Rangers. There is a bin in each site for aluminum, glass and plastic bottle recycling. Camp has 65 total trash and recycling units around camp for your convenience. **IF YOU SEE TRASH ON THE GROUND PLEASE PICK IT UP AND HELP US TO KEEP CAMP CLEAN!**

# ARRIVING AT CAMP



## Directions

### **Directions from the North, East, or South:**

Proceed to the Village of Pioneer, Ohio, located on Ohio Route 15 (Michigan Route 99) just north of US 20.  
Turn west on First Street (County Road R), in Pioneer.  
Turn North (right) on County Road 8  
Turn West (left) on County Road S  
Pioneer Scout Reservation will be on your right in approximately  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a mile

### **From the West:**

Turn North on County Road 8 (Williams County) directly from U.S. 20  
Turn West (left) on County Road S  
Pioneer Scout Reservation will be on your right in approximately  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a mile

## Adult Leader Responsibilities at camp

- Remain with the youth Scouts at all times. Ensure that each Scout has their privacy when appropriate.
- Accompany Scouts to program areas in a timely fashion
- Review the camp emergency plans daily
- Ensure the buddy system is being used
- Check daily attendance for all Scouts in your den
- Assist program staff at all program areas
- Maintain discipline of the Scouts in your den (this is not the program staff's responsibility)
- Report serious discipline, health or other problems to the Camp Director
- Complete evaluation forms and turn them in at checkout
- NO ONE IS ALLOWED TO REMOVE A CHILD FROM CAMP WITHOUT CHECKING OUT AT THE CAMP OFFICE, if you intend to car pool, you MUST be named on the permission section of the Camper Release form
- MOST IMPORTANTLY: HAVE FUN

## Arrival Procedures

- Arrival at Camp Frontier will be from 3:00pm until 4:00pm on Sunday or Wednesday. Packs should arrive as a group. You will be greeted at Frontier Headquarters and will be assisted to your site. Gear will be taken back to your site.
- All Scouts and leaders should arrive in full uniform as much as is possible.
- Arrow of Light Scouts and leaders will hike to campsite and check into their tents.
- As soon as you get to your site, get changed into your swimsuits and head to the pool for swim checks.
- On the way to and from the Pool, the staff guide will point out where things are in camp.

# MEDICAL INFORMATION

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## Health Lodge/Medical Treatment

Medical personnel are provided by the camp to administer to the health needs of campers.

## Health Forms

Health forms must be on file at the Health Lodge for everyone in camp. They will be returned to you prior to your departure on Saturday.

Please download the current BSA Health Form and fill out parts A and B from: <https://www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/ahmr/>.

The form must be turned in at your Pre-Camp Leaders Meeting for all Scouts and Adults coming to camp.

## Informed Consent, Release Agreement, and Authorization Form

A consent and release form must be signed and turned in for every youth and adult attending camp. Please bring these and turn them in at the pre-camp leaders meeting.

## CPAP Machine Power Units

If your unit requires power in their site for a CPAP machine, we can provide a solar unit for \$25 for the week. These units **MUST** only be used for CPAP power. If desired, please reserve when signing up for camp online as supplies are limited.

## Youth Medications

Leaders and parents are responsible for the administration and handling of youth medications in their Pack. There is a refrigerator in the Health Lodge for medications that need to be kept cool.

## Life-Threatening Emergencies

Over 90% of our staff are trained in CPR /AED training. **AN AED IS AVAILABLE AT THE HEALTH LODGE AND AT THE POOL.**

**Emergencies During the Day-** Medical personnel can be reached via the office staff in Loftus Lodge or in any program area during non-posted hours **FOR EMERGENCIES ONLY.**

**Emergencies After Hours/at Night-** There is an emergency radio located in the Leader's side of the pool shower house near the AED. Instructions on use are posted as well. At night, in addition to the radio at the pool, there are staff members with radio communication in both the Health Lodge and Male Staff site. In the Health Lodge please wake the staff in the room with the EMT sign on it. In staff site, please wake the staff in the hut with the red medical cross.

**Hospital Transport-** Any campers with a serious illness or injury requiring special medical treatment or attention will be taken to Community Hospitals of Williams County – Montpelier, (419) 485-3154. *Parents or emergency contacts will be immediately notified.*

## Medical/Accident Insurance

The Erie Shores Council provides medical/accident insurance coverage for registered Scouts and Leaders in Erie Shores Council. Insurance is the responsibility of out of council Packs. All accidents must be reported to the Health Officer. Some Out of Council Packs have Council Insurance; please check with your council. Council provided medical insurance applies to what your primary insurance doesn't already cover.

# CAMP GUIDELINES AND PROCEDURES

**Failure to comply with any of these policies and guidelines is cause for dismissal from camp property**

## **Scout Oath and Law**

The Scout Oath and Law are the codes of conduct and behavior at Camp Frontier.

## **No Smoking**

The Boy Scouts of America strongly discourages smoking on all camp properties. Smoking, **VAPING**, and use of smokeless tobacco is not permitted by anyone under the age of 18. For adults who choose to use any of the products listed above, we request that you do not use these products in front of Scouts and away from buildings and tents. **Smoking in any building or tent or within 50 feet of the door of one of these structures is prohibited by LAW.**

## **Closed Areas**

Program areas are off limits when closed. Campers should not enter other Troop areas unless invited. Staff areas are off limits to Leaders and Scouts except for emergencies.

## **Archery and Firearms**

Scouts and Leaders may not bring personal bows or firearms. PSR is privately owned and does not permit concealed carry weapons on the property.

## **Check-in & Check-out**

Everyone (Scouts, Leaders, staff, and visitors) who enter or leave camp during the week **MUST** check in and out of camp at Loftus Lodge. Every Scout and Leader on camp **MUST** wear the supplied camp wristband when in camp. Replacements can be acquired at the Business office.

## **Bicycles**

Scouts and adults may **NOT** bring personal bikes to camp. If a Bicycle is needed for mobility assistance, please refer our vehicle policy for more info.

## **Firewood**

Due to the threat of invasive species and insects, **units are prohibited from bringing their own firewood to camp.** There is adequate downed wood at camp to provide for many campfires. Units will have to cut and split their own firewood. **Chainsaws are not permitted.** Standing trees are not permitted to be cut down. A charge will be imposed for cutting down standing timber.

**Pioneering Poles:** Units may bring their own pioneering poles for use IF the bark is removed before being transported to camp. A limited number of pioneering poles are available for checkout in the COSA area and must be returned to the COSA area at the end of the week.

## **Swim Checks**

No one may use the aquatics areas (lake or pool) until they furnish a current health form and passed a swim check conducted by OUR aquatics staff. **Due to the inherent dangers of lake swimming, there can be no exceptions to this rule.**

## **Uniforms**

Full uniforms are to be tucked in and worn daily for retreat and dinner, as well as for all vespers services and campfires. Troops should also arrive and depart in full uniform. Shorts and Scout t-shirts are recommended during the day. Closed toed shoes must be worn in camp at all times, excluding some aquatics activities. Open-toed shoes are **not** permitted in camp.

## **No Pets**

No pets are permitted on property at any time. This includes picking up/dropping off Scouts. **Please remind your parents to leave their pets at home.**

## **Vehicle Policy**


**Personal vehicles are not allowed in campsites.** Any Scouts or Leaders in need of mobility assistance must have written need documented on their camp physical by a physician and file a Mobility Assistance Device Request Form at least 4 weeks prior to their stay at camp. If approved, Troops may choose to bring their own mobility device or for an additional fee use one provided by camp. Traditional golf carts, electric wheelchairs/scooters, and bicycles are the only vehicles permitted in the campsites. **Gators, ATVs, and personal vehicles will not be permitted.** Mobility Assistance Device Request Forms can be found on our webpage at [www.psrweb.org/MobilityAssistance](http://www.psrweb.org/MobilityAssistance).

## **Flames & Fuels**

No fires or flames inside tents. No propane or white gas lanterns in tents. All liquid and gas fuels are to be used, filled, and stored under adult supervision. No liquid fuel, other than that in the tanks, may be left in the campsites. The camp provides a facility for proper storage. Please refer to your updated "Guide to Safe Scouting" (#34416, also revised quarterly on the National Council website).

## **Camp Drones Policy**

While drones (also known as sUAS) are sure to become part of the typical BSA program, we request that during summer camp, drones are used at a minimum or not at all. If you still choose to bring a drone, you are required to meet these guidelines and notify the Business office of the owner and possible operators:

- Review and be familiar with the information at <http://knowbeforeyoufly.org/>  so you can fly responsibly. The organization provides these recommendations:
- Fly no higher than 400 feet and remain below any surrounding obstacles when possible.
- Keep your sUAS in eyesight at all times and use an observer to assist if needed.
- Do not intentionally fly over unprotected persons or moving vehicles and remain at least 25 feet away from individuals and vulnerable property.
- Ensure the operating environment is safe and that the operator is competent and proficient in the operation of the sUAS.
- Do not conduct surveillance or photograph persons in areas where there is an expectation of privacy without the individual's permission. Specifically, near the pool showers.

Any infractions of the above rules may result in loss of flying privileges. Anyone breaking the last point above will be turned over to the local sheriff office.

## **Prohibited in Camp**

The following are absolutely prohibited on camp property: fireworks and explosives of any kind, sheath knives (carried on your person, this does not include kitchen knives), pets, personal firearms or ammunition, alcoholic beverages, illegal drugs, water balloon launchers, and slingshots.

I understand that participation in Scouting activities involves the risk of personal injury, including death, due to the physical, mental, and emotional challenges in the activities offered. Information about those activities may be obtained from the venue, activity coordinators, or your local council. I also understand that participation in these activities is entirely voluntary and requires participants to follow instructions and abide by all applicable rules and the standards of conduct.

In case of an emergency involving me or my child, I understand that efforts will be made to contact the individual listed as the emergency contact person by the medical provider and/or adult leader. In the event that this person cannot be reached, permission is hereby given to the medical provider selected by the adult leader in charge to secure proper treatment, including hospitalization, anesthesia, surgery, or injections of medication for me or my child. Medical providers are authorized to disclose protected health information to the adult in charge, camp medical staff, camp management, and/or any physician or health-care provider involved in providing medical care to the participant. Protected Health Information/ Confidential Health Information (PHI/CHI) under the Standards for Privacy of Individually Identifiable Health Information, 45 C.F.R. §§160.103, 164.501, etc. seq., as amended from time to time, includes examination findings, test results, and treatment provided for purposes of medical evaluation of the participant, follow-up and communication with the participant's parents or guardian, and/or determination of the participant's ability to continue in the program activities.

(If applicable) I have carefully considered the risk involved and hereby give my informed consent for my child to participate in all activities offered in the program. I further authorize the sharing of the information on this form with any BSA volunteers or professionals who need to know of medical conditions that may require special consideration in conducting Scouting activities.

With appreciation of the dangers and risks associated with programs and activities, on my own behalf and/or on behalf of my child, I hereby fully and completely release and waive any and all claims for personal injury, death, or loss that may arise against the Boy Scouts of America, the local council, the activity coordinators, and all employees, volunteers, related parties, or other organizations associated with any program or activity.

I also hereby assign and grant to the local council and the Boy Scouts of America, as well as their authorized representatives, the right and permission to use and publish the photographs/film/videotapes/electronic representations and/or sound recordings made of me or my child at all Scouting activities, and I hereby release the Boy Scouts of America, the local council, the activity coordinators, and all employees, volunteers, related parties, or other organizations associated with the activity from any and all liability from such use and publication. I further authorize the reproduction, sale, copyright, exhibit, broadcast, electronic storage, and/or distribution of said photographs/film/videotapes/electronic representations and/or sound recordings without limitation at the discretion of the BSA, and I specifically waive any right to any compensation I may have for any of the foregoing.

NOTE: Due to the nature of programs and activities, the Boy Scouts of America and local councils cannot continually monitor compliance of program participants or any limitations imposed upon them by parents or medical providers.
